Youth Challenge Graduation

Landreneau, head of the Louisiana National Guard along with one of the graduates.) An overflow crowd at Louisiana College's Guinn Auditorium saw 205 young men and women from around the state, whose lives have been changed by the Youth Challenge Program, get their diploma.

Since it's inception in 1993, YCP has been helping at-risk adolescents gain a new lease on life. In May, competing against 26 other states who operate Youth Challenge Programs, the Louisiana National Guard's YCP took the top honors by the United Services Organization as the recipient of the Volunteer Service to Education's Best All-Around Award. YCP at Camp Beauregard runs two classes per year - January through June and from July through December. To be eligible to enroll, a teen-ager must be a Louisiana resident, drug free, have no felony convictions, a high school dropout and must volunteer to participate in the program. Participants are not obligated to enlist in the military upon graduation and there is no cost to participants or their families.
